LINDA SCHERZ ALLEN

Linda Scherz Allen, from Rome, New York, will be teaching three basket classes at the 2016 Association of Michigan Basketmakers convention in Lansing, MI, in October. These classes include Bellsu, Distinction, and Survival Bowl.

Linda's journey in basketry began in the late 1980's shortly after moving to the edge of the Adirondack Park in Northern NY. Her first basket was a 6" melon basket. Within a few short years she was making many different styles and types of baskets. By the early 1990's she had opened a successful shop in her home, was teaching locally and had joined an artists' cooperative in Old Forge to sell her wares. Linda enjoys working with a variety of materials, allowing her imagination to roam freely as she creates her baskets. Initially working with only reed, her interest quickly expanded to bark, then waxed linen. When able she enjoys being out in nature and harvesting white pine or red pine bark from downed trees. She likes to incorporate woodsy elements into some of her baskets as it reflects her love of the outdoors and the Adirondacks. She also loves to recreate the vibrancy of nature in her baskets through a technique called dye-painting. The journey of exploration continued once introduced to waxed linen creating her miniature baskets. Her love for designing, color and pattern is expressed with each new piece.

Recently recognized for her work on the National level in 2012 at the Annual Fine Furnishings Show in Providence, RI, Linda was awarded "Best in Show for Fine Art/Craft: Body of Work." In 2013 one of her baskets was selected for the National Basketry Organizations All Things Considered VII Exhibition and in 2015 another basket was selected for All Things Considered VIII Exhibition.



DENISE ANTHONY

Denise Anthony, from Robbinsville, North Carolina, will be teaching five baskets at the 2016 Association of Michigan Basketmakers convention in Lansing, MI, in October. These classes include Garnish with Leather, Dave's Floor Basket. Day Tripper Backpack, Tulips Wastepaper Basket, and Swirl on a Triangle.

Denise moved from Lake Orion, MI, to the mountains of North Carolina in 1987. Her first job was at a family resort where she taught many crafts including leather work, copper enameling, beading, and hand stitching. Since she needed to learn how to make baskets as part of her job, she had the help of the North Carolina Cooperative Extension with a day of instruction and access to resources. She also used Lyn Siler's The Basket Book to further her education. Denise immediately began to design and teach baskets that guests could make in a four-hour class.

Denise has been a featured artist with a traveling photo exhibition of North Carolina artists: "By our Hands," which was sponsored by Handmade in America in 1996. She has taught at many state basketry conventions including North Carolina, Indiana, Tennessee, South Carolina, Kentucky, Missouri, and Georgia.

Her mission is to introduce her passion of basket making to the next generation through an after school program where she teaches baskets to children in grades 2-6. Denise also has had a series of basket making classes for adults at her local community college as well as mentoring high school students who have chosen basketry for a senior project which is a requirement for graduation in her county.

Living in the mountains in North Carolina has afforded Denise many opportunities. With two Cherokee Indian Reservations in close proximity, she has made many friends in the Native American communities. She has been called upon to repair and restore a number of family heirlooms.

Most of Denise's basket designs are functional. She likes to add unusual materials and techniques as well as recycle whenever possible. Her husband who works in the movie industry in Atlanta, Georgia, will frequently bring raw materials home for Denise to mill into basket parts.

Denise does make frequent trips to Michigan to visit family and friends.
